Dear General Tsigounis,

On 10 August I repretfully surrendered command of IX US Corps and the Greek Expeditionary Forces to my successor. I was reassigned to my present command which has command and operational supervision of the three ROK Corps, composing the Korean Army in the field. I am departing this command for the United States within a few days.

I would fail my duties, myself, and the Greek Armed Forces if I did not, prior to my departure, comment upon the character of service rendered by your Expeditionary Forces Battalion which served under me.

This command, true to Greek tradition, more than lived up to what you and I both expected of it. Never chring the ten and one-half months under my command did my nember of the Breek Battailen come to my unfavorable attention for any disciplinary, administrative or combat operational reson. On the other hand I never heard my command other than of the highest praise for all members of this Battailen in every qualification that goes to make up the solders and the fighting unit, nor at any time did I observe snything other than qualities of the highest order. And I might remark in passing that I was a most frequent visite to the Greek Battailen, both while in reserve and in the front lime. If the specifically outstanding in a crisis, several of which occured dering periods while it was holding front line positions, the mest noteworthy

of which occured in the middle of June during the Battle of "Hearry". On this occasion one Company of this Battalion successfully withstood three of the most violent attacks lamonthed against this position in rapid succession during darkness, by no less than two full-strength Communist Battalions. This feat alone marked this command for what it is, a fine courageous and determined representative of the Greek Arny as you and I have it in the list campaigns in the Vital and the Grance. To them I can pay no higher tribute.

I cannot say too much for the outstanding leadership displayed by your Battalion Commanders. I have previously written you concerning Colonel Tamashas. New I would like to comment briefly upon Colonel George Kommankop.

I have previously indersed an Efficiency Report rendered spen Colonel Regumenace by this Regimental Commander, Colonel Ahers of the 15th Infantry wise, I hope, has resched you by this time. In this Efficiency Report both the Regimental Commander and I stated categorieally that Lieutenant Colonel Romannahos was one of the most outstanding and courageous Battailon Comminders of our experience. I wish to repeat that secretion personally to you? The outstanding amone in which he administered the affairs of the Greek Battailon and the courage and determination which he instilled into his subordinates of all ranks by personal presept and personal example are, in my opinion, the factors with contributed most to the great success of the Battailon dring the critical periods while

under my command. I cannot say too much for his personal and professional qualifications which are thoroughly in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. This officer can command an Infantry Regisman and perform the duties of a Briganier General Assistant Division Commander with high credit and distinction. He can, with little experience, command an Infantry Division in a similar fashion. I wish to recommend him to your personal attention and to the personal attention of those who follow you later in your high effice to the end that he may reach General Officer Grade for which he is nowlfitted, as early as possible. I would also appreciate it'if you would bring this matter to the personal attention of the Chief of the National Defense General Staff and to the attention of His Excellency the Fries History, Field Marshal Phopos.

Although my contacts with Lieutennit Colonel Romanshos' successor, Lieutennit Colonel Prohas, have been for brouse of my change in assignment, I have been senured by his present Division Commander that he measures fully up to the standard as set by his predocessors.

As one of my lest official nots in force I wish to convey to you as Chief of Staff, Oresh Army, to the Chief of the Estional Defence General Staff, and to Field Worthal Papages my despiy-felt gratitude for providing as such outstanding representatives of the Army with which I served in 1986, 1989, 1950 and 1951.

Please convey my very best vishes to Field Marshal Papagos, to Ritriledts, Origorouplas, Tashalotos, Ranodakis, Balodemis, Dowse, Zaimis, and my many other friends in the Greek Armed Forces who are too numerous to mention To yourself, my personal thanks and my warment personal and bighest

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
