
Dear Professor Stavrou:

Thank you very much for your recent letter. I have for some time been concerned over developments in Greece, and its implications for the security for the NATO countries. The situation in Greece is clearly one of the most important questions which besets the Alliance, and it simply can no longer be ignored. I hope my remarks will be helpful in this regard.

On June 25 Senator Pell introduced an amendment to the foreign military sales bill (S.1443) conditioning future military aid to Greece on a Presidential report to the Congress finding that Greece is in compliance with all of its NATO obligations, including those political principles expressed in the preamble to the North Atlantic Treaty. I cosponsored and voted for this amendment. You may be interested in the discussion of this legislation which appears in the enclosed June 25 Congressional Record.
